Two of the tours listed for Christmas week included New York Talks and Walks' "Brooklyn Bridge Walk Into The New Year," beginning with the history of the City Hall area and then the famous bridge itself, and Big Onion Walking Tours' "Christmas Day Jewish Lower East Side Tour," highlighting buildings, landmarks and stories of Jewish immigrant families.

These dogs have helped their new owners, kids between the ages of 6-12, to socialize, be less lonely, and have responsibility. In the past 15 years, North Star Foundation has created over 250 assistance dog partnerships all over the world.

It's the Goldbergs' job to get these adorable puppies ready for their new home. The dogs must be housebroken, crate-trained, socialized and able to follow basic commands before they go home with their new owners. As any of us who have dogs know very well, training a puppy is hard work! But Nancy and her boys just see it as a way of helping people, and their dedication to this cause is sincere and selfless. Throughout the training, they also work with the families to ensure a

smooth transition to the pup's forever home. This includes multiple family visits to their home when geographically possible, giving the child and the puppy time to bond.

was wrong with his owner one night, put his paw on her chest, got her parents' attention, and aided in getting her the medical help she needed. (Yes - WOW!)

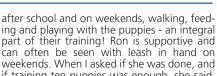

#### KYBELLA-REINVENTING THE WHEEL

Recently the FDA approved a drug called Kybella® for the reduction of fat in the submental area (under the chin). Kybella® is composed of deoxycholic acid, a bile salt made by the liver to help dissolve the fat that you eat. Although touted by the manufacturer as revolutionary and first of its kind, the aesthetic industry has been using a compounded formula which includes deoxycholic acid for fat reduction for decades. First developed in Italy in the 1980's, Lipodissolve™ (also called Lipotherapy™) involves a series of microinjections of PC/DC (phosphatidyl choline and deoxycholic acid). Together they act to break the bonds in fat cells. Fat then liquifies and is eliminated by the body. Lipodissolve™ first became popular in the United States in 2002 as celebrities such as Brittany Spears praised its benefits.

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little as 7 days following the first injections, the full effect of fat dissolution and skin shrinkage may take 3-6 months.

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# THE MIND HOW WE MEASURE

SELF-WORTH
NO ONE GETS A TROPHY FOR
"MOST CONSIDERATE"

How do you measure your self-worth? Do you perceive yourself as a competent person? Are you successful? We live in a highly competitive society where self-worth is most readily measured by our achievements. Self-esteem and self-worth tend to be highly contingent upon the accumulation of accomplishments – observable, measurable accomplishments. Getting a huge promotion, straight A's on a report card, scoring 3 goals in a game, and earning first place in a forensics competition are all signs of success and will certainly feed your self-worth and self-esteem. But we are often neglecting what I consider to be a lack of acknowledgement of some important personal attributes that can enhance your view of yourself. These attributes are personality characteristics and deeds that are not necessarily awarded or rewarded with observable recognition. The fact is that we do not give awards for being sensitive to others, caring for others, giving of time, paying close attention to others' needs, good sportsmanship, and putting forth maximum effort even if the outcome is not the best.

Self-esteem is built by receiving the "best actress" Academy Award, the Most Valuable Player in Major League Baseball, Valedictorian of the class, or even getting the game ball for the winning hit, or a medal for first place in a 100 meter freestyle swim meet. These are public acknowledgements that validate competence and self-worth.

But what if you do not excel athletically, academically, or in the creative arts? This can result in having a low opinion of oneself, which is actually quite common. Since what we think and believe about ourselves is the basis for how we feel about ourselves, my therapeutic approach is to challenge my patients' belief system. Sometimes they have misbeliefs or irrational beliefs about themselves. Other times, people with low self-esteem actually have wonderful and valuable strengths that are simply not publically revered. Consequently, these personal characteristics are not identified and do not register into a positive personal schema.

In therapy, there are non-specific aspects in the relationship between the therapist and patient that include perceived interest, attention, and caring by the therapist. When present, these attributes have been found to be as important in determining a positive therapeutic outcome as the actual therapeutic technique used by the therapist. It occurs in the sports arena as well. In basketball, assists are as important as baskets, in baseball, moving the runner over is as important as hitting him in, in football, it is making a great block allowing the running back to score. The work environment is no different. An employee that pays attention to details to avoid big mistakes and save company money is as essential as the salesman who makes the huge sale. The receptionist in a law firm that treats each client as special and important does not directly account for the billable hours, but does make an important contribution to the overall experience of the client. The manager who keeps employees happy so that they remain invested, loyal, and productive is as important as the money that group makes for the company.

Let's take a look at yourself and others in your life and acknowledge important traits that really make a difference and impact others in a positive way. Let's look at effort instead of outcome, the way others are treated instead of how attractive they are, give the game ball to sportsmanship, and the award for "The Most Benevolent." Taking these traits for granted does not enhance self-esteem and self-worth. Acknowledging them places value on them so that you and others can realize how you positively impact others in a way that lasts a lot longer than receiving the award for "Best Salesman of the Year."

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Well, I finally got my "Vinnies"! Two actually. A pair of the more than 15,000 originals that exist worldwide. Hand crafted, custom designed, color matched to perfection and meticulously balanced Lifelike. The Real Deal.

To clarify, a "Vinnie" is the creation of the one and only Vincent Myers, better known as Vinnie, of Little Vinnie's Tattoos in tiny Vicksburg, Maryland. And yes, the "Vinnies" I am referring to are, in fact, tattoos. Truth be told, I've always secretly wanted a tattoo but after reading my son the riot act for get-ting one and begging my daughter to swear off ink for life, it hardly seemed appropriate. And then something changed.

But back to Vinnie. Vinnie is an internationally recognized artist and has been tattooing for over 3 decades. I recently learned that he has a penchant for painting fish and, back in the day, he traveled with the Grateful Dead as the band's personal tattoo artist. Obviously his art runs the gamut. I would characterize my Vinnies as two of his more basic designs. After all, there's really nothing more basic than a good old-fashioned nipple. As in: the standard decoration on the human breast.

In a nutshell, I lost my nipples along with my breasts in 2014 to 2 different invasive breast cancers and I've been living nippless for over 19 months. That may not seem very long in ordinary time but in the breast cancer universe, it feels like an eternity. After several reconstructive procedures I am, for the most part, restored and I finally have moments, even days, when cancer doesn't occupy my every thought. People tell you that will happen but you never really believe it's possible. I can tell you, it is.

But back to Vinnie. In his 30 years of tattooing Vinnie has spent the past 15 focused on nipples The Johns Hopkins Breast Center (specifically, it's Director Lillie Shockney, a 2 time survivor who sports her own set of Vinnies) was responsible for his meteoric success. Most of his work is still done in his suburban Baltimore shop, in an obscure little strip mall bordered by cornfields. Once a month he travels to New Orleans to help the women of the Big Easy, where he was recruited by the pioneers of groundbreaking tissue flap procedures, The Center for Restorative Breast Cancer, Surgeons far and wide

are constantly sending him their patients and

Vinnie is in such high demand in the breast cancer community that the average wait for an appointment with him is approaching 8 months. Women are frustrated with the mediocre, one dimensional, vegetable dyed tattoos that they are receiving in their doctor's offices by minimally trained medical professionals who, through no fault of their own, are not experienced tattoo artists. These organic nipples not only look unrealistic but they fade. So word spread like wildfire about Vinnie's authentic ink. Nipples and their accompanying areolas are now ALL he does. Day in, day out, it's nipples and areolas for Vinnie. Do the math...7 women a day, 5 days a week, most weeks of the year. That's a lot of nipples. A lot of women. Too much breast cancer.

Vinnie has become the brass ring at the end of the breast cancer merry-go-round, when you're so dizzy from all the revolutions that it's hard to muster enthusiasm for yet another whorl. But maybe that's one reason the long wait is less frustrating than you would imagine. Unlike the first weeks after diagnosis, when nothing can move fast enough to just GET IT OUT, this is an opportunity to slow down, to appreciate the doctor-free months, to just breath.

At 58, I wasn't too concerned about nipples. I've been married to the same mensch of a man for 33 years, my kids are grown, I no longer wear revealing clothing (ok, so I never wore revealing clothing. Whatever) and I can't imagine a scenario in the future where it would matter much if my nipples were MIA. I look acceptable in a bathing suit and noone is the wiser. Except me.

But back to Vinnie. Overwhelmed with his nipple load, Vinnie handpicked 2 other compassionate and uber talented tattoo artists to learn his craft. They now fashion nearly as many trompe l'oeil nipples in a day as Vinnie does. Again, do the math. It's mindblowing. And exhausting. So occasionally Vinnie chills out. He loves to fish and will escape for a day to clear his mind and regroup for the emotional commitment he has made to making women whole

One reason I wanted to rendezvous with Vinnie was his map. He has a map of the world on the wall of his shop and that map is covered with pins, each pin representing one woman and where she came from. As I stood staring at that map, oozing but pain free after Vinnie worked his magic, I wanted to cry. Thousands of pins, women from every single continent, dozens of countries, and every state in the U.S. All of those women, all of their stories, some now strutting their Vinnies with pride, other no longer here to strut. It was overwhelming. I picked up a pin and searched for a millimeter of space to plunge it into NYC. But instead, I had to settle for somewhere off the coast, floating in the L.I. Sound. Too many women were there before me. Too many pins. Too much breast cancer

But back to Vinnie. Thank God for Vinnie! I challenge anyone to look at a pair of his 3D's and not do a double take. He's THAT good. His congenial manner and sense of humor make a somewhat bizarre hour (dare I say it?) FUN. He's a magician, creating an illusion so that the reflection we see in the mirror is not a constant reminder of loss. His Vinnies actually trick the brain into thinking the body actually

I can imagine how it might get tedious for an

artist like Vinnie to funnel all of his creative energy into such a restricting endeavor. But I'm confident he absorbs our immense gratitude and he admits he is inspired by the positive attitudes and kindness of some of his clients. His sister is one of us, diagnosed at the exact moment when Vinnie was considering hanging up his nipple needles. He took that as a sign that we needed him more than he needed to stop.

Vinnie's knowledge of breast cancer, reconstruction, patient's rights, standards of care, surgical skill, breast surgeons, plastic surgeons and NIPPLES is admirable and he uses that knowledge wisely. He knows his place. But he's not just "that tattoo guy". His perspective is precious, as he has seen more reconstructed breasts than most doctors ever will. He is well respected in the medical community and makes no qualms about telling them what he thinks (a touchy scenario with ego centric surgeons!).Vin-nie also works tirelessly to spread the word that reconstruction is not only legally mandated for every woman in this country but that good reconstruction should be the norm, not the exception.

I don't often speak about my journey, mainly because it pales in comparison to what so many others have been through. But after connecting with dozens of women through various sources, I've learned that each of our perspectives is unique, important and invaluable. At the right moments, we have knowledge that can help those who come behind us. We can relate. We know.

Vinnie knows too and is willing to take his talent anywhere on the globe where he is needed. He recently established a non profit to help the women who can't afford him and have little chance of ever making it to Vicksburg. The gratitude I feel for Vinnie makes me want to be a crusader for his cause, to find a creative way to help. We'll see. Life has a way of guiding you to where you should ultimately be. As much as I admire Vinnie, I dream of the day when he is out of business. When there are no more nipple tattoos, no more pins, no more breast cancer. Hopefully, all that will remain is a sign on his door that reads: " GONE FISHIN' "

Pain! No one likes to be in pain, or see someone suffering from pain, but pain is your body's way of letting you know that something is wrong. 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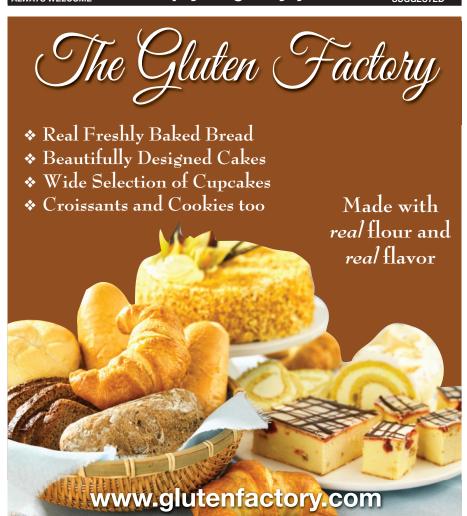
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#### REDO YOUR KITCHEN CABINETS WITHOUT HIRING A CONTRACTOR

You can have a healthier body and life by redoing your kitchen. And you don't need a contractor or tons of cash. All you need to do is throw away the junk food. I am not talking about the potato chips. I am talking about the food that you may not realize (until now) are not your best options. Hidden sugars and salt are in most grocry store packaged foods. You can learn to make more mindful choices around your food selection by ditching the old and switching to new and better items to replace it.

Much of the food you eat is the food you've always eaten. They are habitual purchases. You stick to one brand and may not even realize what it is that you are actually taking into your body. You never even look at the label. These sorts of blind purchases, where you don't know what you are eating, are dangerous to your health. Over the long term, bad food is bad for you.

#### What constitutes bad food.

Bad food is food that has been altered with chemicals, additives, extra sugar and salt to enhance the flavor and trick your tastebuds into wanting more. It's food that has minimal nutritional value because it's all been taken out in the processing. This would be most of the packaged processed foods the you find in the middle of the grocery store.

Before you get nervous that you may be confused or starving now, there are many options. Sacrificing your enjoyment for eating is not a worry. Food that is good for you tastes good too. But you do need to allow your tastebuds time to get used to the changes. So be patient and step slowly

#### The first step to getting better.

Lets focus on 3 things you can do to clean up your cabinets. Number one is your attitude. You begin by first falling in love with this clean (I like to refer to it as naked) eating idea because doing things you love are always easier to do. The truth is that simple changes in the food you eat will make you feel physically better within the first week of changing it. The truth is that taking charge of your eating and honoring your body with the food that heals and nourishes it will make you feel mentally better after a few days too.

#### Making changes without sacrificing or suffering.

Change is easier when you have action steps to take. Little baby stepping stones that continually move you forward. The first thing you do is access the situation with the foods that you currently eat on a consistent basis. Turn over the box or bottle and read the ingredients list. Can you pronounce the ingredients? Are there more than 5 ingredients? Could you make this product yourself? If you did make it yourself, would you put all the extras into the bowl?

Salad dressing is a big one for adding extra crap. What type of salad dressing are you using now? What is on the list of ingredients? Are the ingredients simple, pure and naked enough for your precious, healthy, sexy body?

What brand of peanut butter are you currently choosing? What are the ingredients? Is it made pure peanuts? (Because that's all you need to make peanut butter delicious)

What brand of cereal are you using? What are the ingredients? Can you pronounce them all? Do you know what they are? Can you do better?

I call this exercise "Ditch and Switch," ditch the old and switch in the newer healthier version. You don't have to give up the foods you love. You simply choose a healthier version. Remember start slowly. Don't overwhelm yourself. Results show up in huge ways from the small changes that you make. And...practice always makes better.

Here is a simple recipe for a warm naked (clean)

**THE PEANUT BUTTER** - Ditch your peanut butter that lists ingredients as: *peanuts, fully hydrogenated vegetable oils, molasses, sugar and salt.* 

Switch to the peanut butter (ex: Crazy Richards or other brand) that lists ingredients as: *peanuts only.* 

**THE BREAD** - Ditch the Whole Wheat Breads that lists ingredients as: wheat flour, enriched flour, niacin, iron, Vitamin B, soybean oil, butter, nonfat milk, wheat gluten, honey, salt, mono and diglycerides, soy lecithin, enzymes, folic

Switch to sprouted grain breads (ex: EZEKIEL or similar brand) that list ingredients as: organic sprouted wheat, organic raisins, organic sprouted barley, organic sprouted millet, organic sprouted lentils, organic sprouted spelt, sea salt, organic cinnamon.

**THE JAM** - Ditch the grape jelly that lists ingredients as: grapes, corn syrup, high fructose corn syrup, fruit pectin, citric acid, sodium citrate.

Switch to fruit preserves (Ex: Dalfor or other brand) that list ingredients as: *strawberries, concentrated grape juice, fruit pectin, lemon juice.* 

PB&J Recipe Directions: Spread 1 tbsp peanut butter, 1 tbsp jam and 1/2 sliced banana onto bread and cover with 2nd slice. Melt 1 tbsp coconut oil in heated pan and place sandwich in pan. Brown side of bread and turn to brown second side. Cut in half and serve with tea.

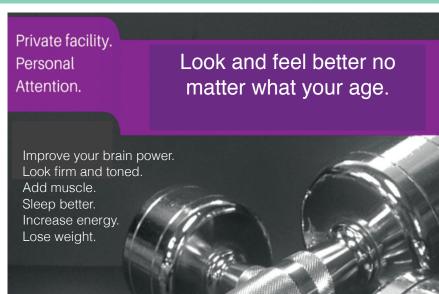
#### YUM and easy.

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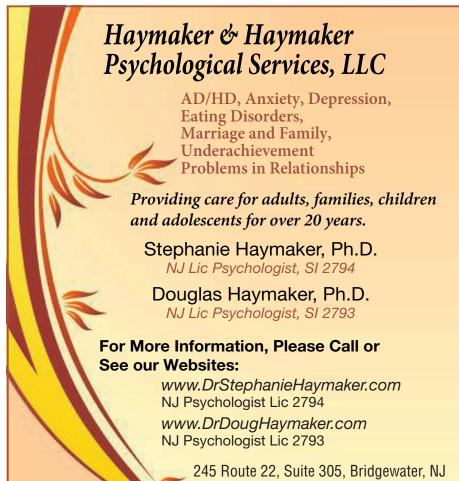

Stories about eating disorders are often in the news - some enlightening and some sensational. It can be hard to know what to do if you or a loved one is struggling. Years of clinical studies point to one certainty. Eating disorders are about much more than eating. In a culture obsessed with appearance and dieting, how do you recognize when a person's behaviors have become dangerous?

The Diagnostic and Statistical Manual for Mental Disorders – Fifth Edition (DSM-5) now categorizes eating disorders (ED) into three categories: Anorexia Nervosa, Bulimia Nervosa and Binge Eating Disorder. Anorexia Nervosa is characterized by severe restricting of food intake, fear of gaining weight, difficulty maintaining a healthy weight and body image distortion. Weight loss may be so significant that the person becomes medically unstable. Bulimia Nervosa is diagnosed when a person binge eats a large amount of food, and then tries to undo the binge, either with vomiting, abusing laxatives or over-exercising. He/she often feels stressed and guilty about these actions. Binge Eating Disorder, the most recent addition to the DSM-5, involves frequent binges when not physically hungry, without the purging behaviors of bulimia. There is shame, embarrassment and guilt and a sense of loss of control.

All three disorders involve disordered eating, concerns and misperceptions regarding appearance, and sometimes (but not always) severe distress and discomfort. There are medical and psychological factors at play. The consequences of these illnesses can be severe, and at times fatal. Other mental health issues can co-exist

with these problems, most frequently depression, anxiety and substance abuse.

One of the most perplexing questions is why? Why do some people develop these issues and others do not? There are many factors that may contribute. There are biological contributions such as genetics and temperament. There are social and cultural issues such as societal pressures to be thin and unrealistic messages about appearance sent through ads, television and film. Also, social media may distort our expectations about ourselves and our lives. Psychological factors often include low self-esteem, difficulty with coping, perfectionism and lack of healthy boundaries.

The good news is that treatment is available to help those in trouble move on to healthier behaviors and a more balanced life. Most treatment is multidimensional, involving psychotherapy, nutritional education and medical monitoring. Medications can also be helpful to address anxiety and depression issues when present. The first step is to identify the problem. It is an act of great courage to reach out and seek assistance. Many people suffer in silence for years before they ask for help. The more you can educate yourself about these guestions and answers, the better able you are to take action for yourself or your loved one.

# The Man Who Brought Her to the Party

My sister was whirling around the room with the man who brought her to the party! She had watched him dance with her sisters...I, the older one because he had taught me to dance. And Mindy, the youngest one, because nothing would stop her from getting the attention she craved! But it was HER party, and he finally acknowledged how lovely she had become! As she put her arms around his neck, and rested her head on his shoulder, he asked her if she "danced with all the men like this?" "No," my beautiful sister responded, "no, Daddy, just you!"

The party was for Michele's high school graduation, which he had missed the night before, like so many milestones. The night was bittersweet. I was angry with him for not attending this most important night in my sister's life, and I was equally angry at myself for expecting anything different. In fact, if the truth be told, I believe that most of our young lives were far more bitter than sweet...mental illness has a way of doing that to a family.

While Michele was dancing with my father, an exquisite experience for her in its uniqueness, he picked up from the floor and handed her a "lucky dime." They looked so happy, Michele adored being the star of the night, enjoyed being the one in his arms.

Our father died that weekend, an unexpected death dealt him by a massive stroke or heart attack at only 45 years old...who could have anticipated that Michele's high school graduation weekend would end with his funeral? We sobbed, and I put my arms around both of my younger sisters. Michele pulled the dime from the pocket of her black and white striped dress that had brought her so much happiness when she wore it just a few nights before. "This is all I have of him," she quietly uttered.

He lived with bipolar disorder and the fallout was our "normal." Our dad slept away his days, nights and sometimes, weeks. If his car was in the driveway after school, we had to enter quietly, no friends allowed. Television had shown fathers who worked, came home, hugged their children, kissed their wives, sat at dinner and shared their lives; I assumed our lives weren't really worth sharing!

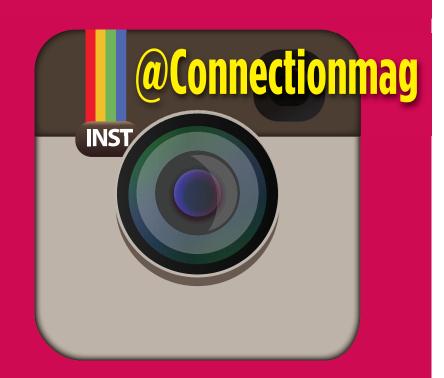
What we did learn was a script, and we were very skilled at playing our roles. We moved from one episode of depression, followed by a period of incredible energy, followed by another period of depression. We never knew exactly what would set off our dad, until it was too late. I remember my mom, sisters and I dressing for a family circle meeting, so excited about seeing our relatives, waiting for dad to come down the stairs. My mom was stunning, and he had to be proud to be with her; we were in their orbit, glowing with the probability of a fun day. Daddy thought one of us said something silly, told us to behave, we looked at each other with fear and admonishment...don't say a word, eyes straight ahead. But it was too late. He had made his decision...we were not going for a festive day; he went to bed, for nearly a week.

Yet when he was happy, and enthused, he was the most engaging, delightful and charismatic man! Everyone's friend, he told a joke with panache and created relationships with the most discerning people. It was not unusual for him to make pancakes at 3:00 in the morning, blowing his trumpet to awaken us! He was incredible, and we loved, adored, and worshipped that man...until the next time when he could be that man no longer.

Our dad had mood swings that cycled ever more frequently over the years. At the end of his young life, they were about two weeks apart, with him rising and falling consistently. In fact, the only consistent in our home was his cycle. There was no medication or even a diagnosis at the time. In truth, who would have made the diagnosis? It was our secret, and we were trapped.

I tell you this because Michele and I were talking about the dimes she has collected over the years since his death in 1969. We believe he is telling us he loves us. It was difficult to feel loved in his home, but if he was treated, if he was free to parent, to protect and guide us, he would not have missed Michele's graduation, he would have taken us to that family meeting and enjoyed our childhood, and we would have lived a very "normal" life. Instead, we wept more tears than the dimes Michele will ever find, sought countless ways to survive our misery, felt alone and different...and yet, we had each other, and even mental illness could not steal that from us!

#### Children Can Be Stressed, Too - JFS Can Help

Jill, a young 9 year girl was referred to JFS by her pediatrician. She was experiencing stress beyond what would be expected of a child of her age. Fears of becoming sick in public and general panic were overwhelming her on a daily basis and negatively impacting her time at school and at home. She had already seen several professionals and medication had been recommended, but she wasn't feeling any better. Her family was beginning to lose hope that her symptoms could be alleviated.

Jill and her parents were met by the JFS social worker and they were seen for an evaluation. It became clear after getting to know Jill and her parents that it was difficult for Jill to handle the typical daily stressors experienced by someone her age and her parents were struggling to provide her the kind of support and guidance she needed. Whatever they did to respond to her needs seemed not to work and everyone was frustrated. Through play therapy coupled with helping Jill

identify and label those things that stressed her out, Jill began to handles situations at school and at home in a more age appropriate manner with reinforcement by her parents. Her fears began to subside. At the same time her parents were provided the opportunity to discuss their experience with Jill and through those discussions came up with alternative ways to handle Jill's upsets. They began to have a better understanding of what would upset her and why, so they could be more proactive in responding to her and meeting her emotional and psychological needs.

After several months Jill was beginning to feel less anxious and fearful and was able to thrive at school and at play and her parents were feeling better and more confident in their parenting style.

Young people today are under a lot of pressure and they are finding themselves busier and more isolated then ever before. Multiple commitments, strained family relationships, increased workloads in school and decreased natural supports are taking their toll on our children and families. Often signs of anxiety have been present for years, but go untreated, as they are difficult to spot. Frequent stomach aches, headaches and inattention, for example, are often misunderstood as medical conditions or ADHD. It isn't until the alarm bells of panic attacks or a major drop in school performance are present, that psychological help is sought.

In addition to providing Mental Health Services, JFS is committed to serving the needs of the entire community and offers a continuum of programs and services. Licensed clinical social workers provide individual, couple and family counseling as well as geriatric assessments, supportive counseling and case management services for home bound elderly. The Family Mentor Program recruits, trains and matches volunteers with vulnerable young families or with elderly persons for friendly, supportive, in-home visits. Fam-

ilies with children with special needs are assisted through social groups, parent groups and through the Family Mentor Program. Career Counseling helps individuals in many aspects of their job search. Ohr Tikvah-Light of Hope Jewish Healing Services offers presentations, support groups, and individual spiritual counseling to address the health, wellness and healing needs of the community. All information is confidential. Many programs are at no cost, on a sliding fee scale or payable through third party insurance.

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#### PING, PONG, POM-POM

By now you may have noticed that Pom-poms are everywhere this season. Real fur, faux-fur, and the wooly variety are the most common. It's easy to update a scarf or hat by adding one or more pom-poms. Kids love wearing them and making them. It's right up there with making cookies.

Pom-poms are easy and fun to make. Gadgets are available, however, DIY (do-it-yourself) is my favorite. You probably have all the supplies needed on hand: yarn, cardboard (a cereal or pasta box will do), scissors, a drinking glass, a quarter, and a pen. Pom-poms use a lot of yarn, so have enough on hand.

Here we go

- **Step 1:** Choose a drinking glass or other model with the circumference equal to the desired size of your finished pom-pom.
- **Step 2:** Trace the rim of the glass onto the cardboard. Cut 2.
- Step 3: Place the quarter in the center of the circles and trace.
- **Step 4:** Imagine the circle is a face of a clock, mark where 2 and 4 would appear. Now cut out this segment plus the entire center outline from the quarter. Each circle now resembles a thick letter "C".
- **Step 5:** Cut a 10" length of yarn. Lay it onto one of the circles so it follows the curves of the "C." Place the other circle on top. The yarn is now sandwiched between the circles.
- **Step 6:** Leaving a 4" tail and without catching the center yarn from step 5, begin wrapping the yarn around the C-form from the inside circle to the outside, evenly, until the center circle is filled and the entire form is completely covered. The more yarn used, the denser the pom-pom. Cut the yarn.
- **Step 7:** Carefully find the top/outer edge of the C-Form. Do not cut the center yarn from step 5. Guide the scissors between the two circles and cut through all thicknesses.
- **Step 8:** Remove the paper C-form to use again. (I've reused mine a dozen times.) Using the long 10" center yarn, pull as tightly as possible and tie a knot to draw all the short cut ends closely together.
- **Step 9:** Fluff out the pom-pom. Without cutting the 10" yarn, trim any stray lengths of yarn. Use the long remaining yarn to attach the pom-pom to your project. Then trim the long ends.

Try making a pom-pom in 2 or more colors.

- Hold all yarns together and wrap This will make a multi-colored variety
- Wrap each color in a set section of the C-Form This will make a striped or color separated variety

Pom-Poms can be added to manufactured pieces too. Use a small crochet hook or tapestry needle to pierce the fabric and draw one tie through the fabric and secure with a knot.

Make mini pom-poms by using the tines of a fork. For details, go to https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=fjxJFcm16r0

Have fun decorating!

P.S. I was able to maintain my stash busting yarn diet for 2015, minus 2 necessary purchases for gifts. In total, 35 completed projects used 88 skeins. Despite this effort, my stash remains healthy and robust. Sigh. I think I'll continue my journey in 2016, however, if I make it to Iceland, all bets are off!

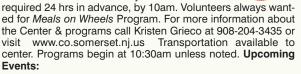

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# BIG OPPLE BITES

#### **Chinatown Calls**

On a day when you are looking for somewhere to spend some time outside, maybe do a little shopping and stop for something to eat, hop on Route 78, head into the Holland Tunnel and find a spot to park in Chinatown. Door to door it's rarely more than 45 minutes.

Canal Street is the main artery of Chinatown, and it is known as much for knock-offs as for food. Stroll up the north side of Canal from West Broadway, and you are immediately approached by hawkers offering Rolex watches and designer handbags of every type. The street is lined with shops and booths brimming with souvenirs, perfumes, jewelry, sunglasses and electronics. Still further up Canal are stores with beautiful Asian art and artifacts. Canal Street offers something for everyone, and it is one of the few places left in New York City where you can still bargain.

If it's time for a break, on Lafayette Street just south of Canal is the appropriately named Excellent Dumpling House at #111. Eat in or get some freshly made vegetable dumplings to go and weather permitting, walk down to the park benches at the end of the street for an al fresco break. Continue north to explore Centre, Baxter and Bayard Streets, working

your way to Mott Street, once the culinary heart of Chinatown. Stop in at a bakery or two for a selection of enticing sweet and savory snacks including my favorite steamed pork buns and refreshing drinks in lemon/plum and mango/basil seed flavors. Down the block is Columbus Park where in warm weather locals congregate to play cards and Chinese checkers.

Take time to explore the wonderful food stalls and markets on Canal Street between Baxter and Mulberry. The steamy store windows feature delicious looking Peking ducks and other meats. Fish stands are brimming with every imaginable type of seafood. Neighborhood shoppers are stocking up on fresh fruits and vegetables, many of which you won't find in a local supermarket. The area's grocery stores offer a wide assortment of well-priced Asian specialty items and are the perfect place to find a lovely bowl or teapot hidden among the colorful displays of teas, spices and housewares.

On the north side of Canal, walk down Elizabeth Street to the Deluxe Food Market at #79. It is a narrow, bustling indoor market with long steam tables selling all types of prepared food for takeout – sweet and sour pork, fried shrimp, dumplings, bean curd, lo mein and sesame chicken are just a sampling – and counters filled with fresh fish, meats, fruits, vegetables, and a large frozen food section. If

you are looking to prepare authentic Chinese dishes, this market offers one stop shopping. If you are looking for unusual ingredients from alligator to rabbit, you can find them here as well.

A few blocks south of Deluxe Food Market at 215 Centre Street is The Museum of Chinese in America which was designed by Maya Lin. Originally founded in 1980 on Mulberry Street, MOCA is the leading museum dedicated to preserving and presenting the history and culture of people of Chinese descent in the United States, and it is a lovely oasis in the midst of Chinatown's hustle and bustle

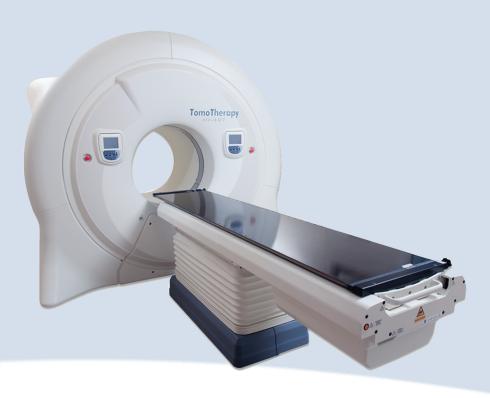

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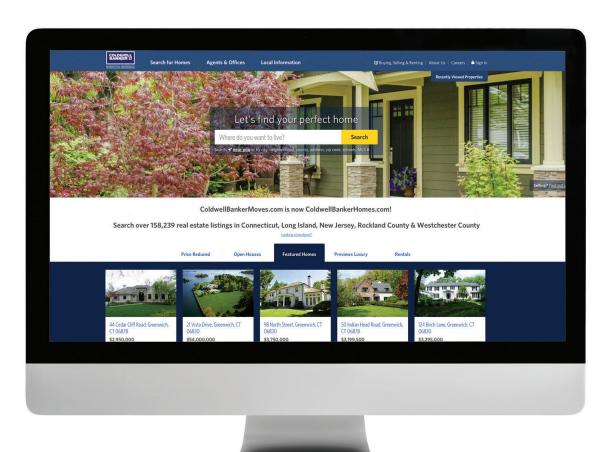
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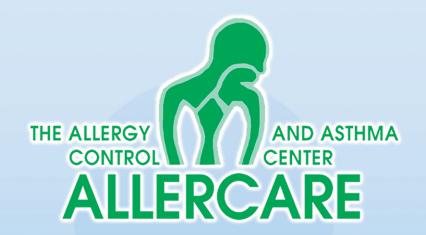






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
